Dear Friends,

The media has a big effect on what we think and the attitudes we adopt whether we are aware of it or not. Watching television, listening to the radio, reading newspapers and magazines shape a person's tendencies of thought, and if that's all they do then they become moulded by them. That's why we encourage people to make a habit of Bible reading and prayer so that a bigger picture than what is going on in the buzz of society around can be got. People complain and strike back at political correctness, or 'PC' as it is called, when they are fed up of being told what to think and believe, but things become PC because of a certain lethargy of mind and thought.

Having just returned from the General Assembly I thought I would write to correct some false impressions that have been given about Assembly business in the media, particularly to do with a very PC area. On the Tuesday afternoon of Assembly Week there was a large much-publicized debate about a report from the Legal Questions Committee on the matter of Civil Partnerships, the new legislation aimed at allowing people in homosexual relationships to have the same rights as married people, albeit not technically called marriage.

The Committee brought before the Assembly a request to pass a Declaratory Act stating that if a minister performed a service of blessing for such a Civil Partnership he or she would not be liable to censure by a court of the Church.

The Committee argued that they were not doing anything new or novel in asking for this (!) - just guarding a minister's freedom of conscience in a pastoral matter. It would be fair to say that the Assembly did not agree with them on that matter.

The Rev. Jock Stein brought a motion that the matter be deferred until a sub-committee on human sexuality reported next year. The Assembly did not go along with that. Subsequently a counter-motion to the Committee's came from the Rev. Gordon Kennedy of Stranraer, who moved that the Assembly give instruction that no minister perform such a service. This was followed by another motion from the Rev. Ian Watson to the effect that both the Committee's motion and Mr Kennedy's counter-motion be re-drafted as Overtures under the Barrier Act\* to go down to Presbyteries for discussion and either approval or disapproval before coming back to next year's General Assembly. Though resisted by the Committee, this was the motion that the Assem-

bly agreed with, thus removing the possibility of a *fait-accompli* on the matter by the Legal Questions Committee.

The Principal Clerk then said that the procedure would be for the Assembly to vote for which Overture (the Committee's or the counter-motion) they wished to be sent down, and then having decided that, a simple 'yes' or 'no' to send the winning Overture down to Presbyteries would be put. On a very close vote of 322 to 314 the Assembly chose the Committee's motion over Mr Kennedy's, and then on a closing vote agreed to send the Committee's recommendation down to Presbyteries for their opinion. A certain amount of confusion existed over the last vote as to whether voting for it meant agreeing with the Committee's motion, especially as the Principal Clerk had said that if the Assembly didn't vote for it then we would have had a long debate but produced nothing as a result. Not a few who voted for it to be sent down were certainly not in agreement with the tenor of it.

When I went home that evening I looked at the BBC's website only to see the headline "Kirk backs Gay Weddings". Let me tell you that that was certainly not the case: what the Assembly did was refuse to take such a decision without first consulting Presbyteries. What needs to be done now is for the Kirk throughout the country to declare its mind on the matter before it comes back to next year's General Assembly. The matter of course belongs to Presbyteries, although any who wish to express an opinion to Presbyteries are free to do so before they discuss the matter, probably around November of this year. I will say more on the matter before then, but in the mean time you may pray that wisdom will prevail throughout the land. Finally, "don't believe everything you read in the papers" is an old truism, but what's perhaps more important is - don't allow yourself to be taught by everything you read or see in the media. Major issues are too important to be decided that way. With every blessing,

\* The Barrier Act is a provision which prevents the General Assembly from taking decisions which might profoundly affect the Church without first referring these downwards to the presbyteries, and is intended to prevent rash decisions to the long-term detriment of the Church.

## CHURCH WITHOUT WALLS — RE-ENERGISE CONFERENCE 2006

Gordon and I attended the above conference for 'Ministers and Motivators' at Aviemore and were among 450 C. of S. people from all over Scotland. It was a challenging 3 night event which was full of opportunities to listen to keynote speakers and to attend a wide variety of seminars. The keynote talks were -



- ◆ A Church Shaped by ... Friendship, by Liz Henderson, Minister in Craigmillar, Edinburgh. Liz was very inspiring and painted a picture of a Church bringing hope to what is one of the toughest areas in Edinburgh
- ◆ A Church Shaped by ... The Gifts of God's People, by Kenny Borthwick, Minister in Wester Hailes, Edinburgh. Kenny's Church is also in a very challenging parish in Edinburgh.
- ◆ A Church Shaped by ... The Gospel. This talk was given by Elaine Storkey, who is a University lecturer and broadcaster. Elaine talks about the Gospel with great authority and enthusiasm and also makes the message very understandable to clergy and lay people alike.
- ◆ A Church Shaped by ... The Neighbourhood, by John Bell. John spoke about how we stand as a church in the wider world, as well as teaching us a song mid-talk!

Apart from all of the above we were encouraged to have a bit of leisure time as well, so we made good use of the leisure facilities as well as joining a prayer walk round Loch an Eilean.

During our after hours leisure time we also got into conversation with Liz Henderson from Craigmillar. The parish where Liz is minister has every kind of problem imaginable - much of it drink and drug related, and yet they have managed to make really meaningful differences within that community. I asked her what we as an out of town parish could do in any way to help, especially in their attempts to reach out to the young mums/couples.
